Differences Certification – FIP

Certification: Third party assessment. Usually third party to the

third party. Sometimes traceability compulsory





FIP: Fisheries Improvement Project

Project to improve fishing practices. Usually self assessment of the progress.

Three basic principles to analyze when assessing environmental sustainability



The fishing activity of the target stock must be at a level which ensures it can continue indefinitely



Fishing operations must be managed to maintain the structure, productivity, function and diversity of the ecosystem



The fishery must comply with relevant laws and have a management and governance system that is responsive to changing circumstances.


¿What is a fishery through the MSC Standard?

Opportunities from Certifications

- Certification standard as a diagnosis tool for fisheries.

Pre-Assessments

F.i. MedFish project



- Certification as a commercial tool to differentiate from competitors
- Certification to show and communicate commitment to sustainability
- Certification to show final consumers sustainable practices

Opportunities from Certifications: Traceability

If **traceability** is compulsory in the certification \rightarrow Increases confidence in the correct labelling of the final product.



OCEANA: "33% of the samples analyzed were misllabelled"



azti - matis: 32% of restaurants served mislabeled fish in the Menu:

- 50% mislabeling of sole
- 27% mislabeling of cod
- 58% mislabeling of red tuna



"The average percentage of reported seafood misdescription across the world was found to be 30%. With this in mind, the fact that fewer than 1% of MSC labelled products were found to be mislabelled is very encouraging..."

- MSC certified plaice fishery of Hastings (Hastings FLAG, UK)
